

Grand Knight's Message

A Council of Many Members

It occurred to me the other day that we are a council of many members and, therefore, a council with many different levels of member involvement. In order to put this concept into perspective it might be useful to take a look at the various levels of involvement. These are only generalizations of course, and there may be considerable smearing between the groupings, but nevertheless, the categories might provide a framework for looking at membership involvement.

Some of our members are supportive members. These members believe in the K of C and believe in the ideals of Charity, Unity, Fraternity and Patriotism. Supportive members may not be active, but they like what the K of C does for the community and for the church. These members may not attend meetings or take roles in the various committees because of reasons which may include limitations of available time or opportunity or health or transportation issues, but yet enjoy being a part of the organization.

Social members: These members may consist of supportive members but also are people who enjoy the company of other members of the council and come to the dinner meetings and/or various social events and take pleasure in associ-

ating with people of like mind, faith and general interests. They may not take part in the projects or activities of the council but do enjoy the company of other Catholic gentlemen.

Active members: These are the members who will support the activities of the council to the extent that their interests, time and resources allow. Usually active members will serve on one or two, or a few committees or projects each year and make a valuable contribution by helping the council to do its good work.

Highly active members: These members consist of the gentlemen who volunteer for many of the activities of the council and serve on many projects and/or committees. They are by definition also supportive members and frequently social members as well. They serve on many projects and often they may be the ones to fill in the gaps as issues and special needs arise.

Sustaining members: Sustaining members are those members who have maintained longstanding highly important roles. These are the members who may not hold office but are the backbone of the organization. They provide stability, continuity and organizational structure. These are the ones who make the organization that which it is. They provide the momentum to keep it going and have the long term

view of what has been done, what needs to be done and often the best way to do it.

The leaders: The leaders are members who volunteer to take on high workload levels and who put forth a great deal of energy for a "short burst." They are the ones who traditionally bring forth change and innovation and move the organization forward. Then, after a while, the leaders may slide down the ladder of involvement to a lower level of activity and will ultimately find a level of involvement that is comfortable and easy for them to maintain becoming the elder statesmen of the organization. Sometimes, however, they will move up the ladder in the larger organization to take on greater responsibilities.

All levels of members are important to the organization and contribute to the critical mass of our council. A characteristic of these levels is that they can be very fluid and members can, and do, easily flow from one level to another and then back again as is comfortable for them. Where do you fall on this continuum? Have you ever thought about becoming more active – or thought about making a larger contribution to the Council? Or are you comfortable with where you are? If you do have an interest in assuming a larger role in the council you might want to join one or more of the many committees or projects of the council or suggest to someone that you might wish to take part in a leadership role. But if you prefer not to that's OK too. We are grateful for your membership.

WCC News

The WCC mortgage balance is just below \$35,000.00. The Mortgage Fund balance (the 10-year pledge drive) is just over \$2,000.00. As the 10-year pledge drive is winding down, it is our hope that those members with remaining balances will be able to complete their pledge.

It's been a pretty tough fall and winter for bookings at the WCC. This has caused us to significantly deplete our mortgage fund reserves. However, we are seeing a nice increase in March and April and hope the trend continues.

Going forward, we plan to develop an ongoing Capital Fund Drive to fund the upgrades, repairs and renovations for our council home. We will invite all members who were unable to participate in the 10-year Mortgage Fund Pledge as well as




all new members after, say 1 year. It will be a one-time pledge which can be spread over several years – perhaps 5 to 10 years, if desired. As an example of what these funds can be used for, GK Joe Kozelsky, Mike Donovan and I have identified almost \$175,000.00 worth of desirable or potential upgrades or renovations. They include: ceiling tile replacements, windows, front entry, storage facility (we'll need to get rid of that trailer sooner or later), covered pavilion, men's lavatory renovation, sliding door replacement, sound system, parking lot, kitchen equipment upgrades.

First Annual St. Thomas More Mass

The St. Thomas More Lawyers Guild on Wed. May 19th at Our Lady of Victory/St. Joseph Church at 12:10 noon is sponsoring its first annual St. Thomas More Mass on their patron saint's 75th canonization anniversary in 1935 by Pope Pius XI. The Mass will be in memory of two deceased former guests of the Guild, whose lives honored the commitment of the martyred saint, Cardinal Avery Dulles and Monsignor William B. Smith. Ironically, GK Chesterton, a Catholic convert, prophetically noted in 1920 that St Thomas More was important, but would be more important in 100 years. Unfortunately, that time has arrived. Pope John Paul II, fully recognized this when he called upon all Catholics, citizens, and politicians to "Be Not Afraid", to stand up to the Culture of Death, and have the courage of St Thomas More to transform society into the Gospel of Life. On October 31, 2000 he proclaimed More to be also the patron saint of statesmen and politicians encouraging Catholics to follow More's example:

There are many reasons for proclaiming Thomas More Patron of statesmen and people in public life. Among these is the need felt by the world of politics and public administration for credible role models able to indicate the path of truth at a time in history when difficult challenges and crucial responsibilities are increasing. Today in fact strongly innovative economic forces are reshaping social structures; on the other hand, scientific achievements in the area of biotechnology underline the need to defend human life at all its different stages, while the promise of a new society – successfully presented to a bewildered public opinion – urgently demand clear political decisions in favor of the family, young people, the elderly, and the marginalized. In this context, it is helpful to turn to the example of St. Thomas More, who distinguished himself by his constant fidelity to legitimate authority and institutions precisely in his intention to serve not power, but the supreme ideal of justice. His life teaches us that government is above all an exercise of virtue.

In the June, 2009 issue of the Knights of Columbus magazine, Columbia, St. Thomas More was declared as the Catholic Man of the Month in which article the author echoes the sentiment of Pope John Paul II for all Knights and their families: "In his life of ardent prayer and steadfast faith, St Thomas More stands as a model not only for statesmen, but for all knights".

All Knights and families are encouraged to support and join the Catholics lawyers, many of whom are fellow knights, in this spiritual endeavor for prayer and guidance to and from this relevant Saint and two great Churchmen in this historical time of critical need for proper moral judgment, discernment, and the courage to act responsibly for all Catholics.
