

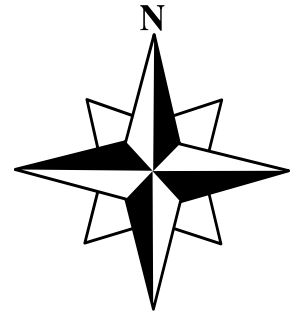

YOU THINK?**

RE: MERGER WITH 8271

We approved the merger resolution with 8271 at our last meeting. The vote was unanimous and we look forward to the completion of the process. I am told that for all intents and purposes we can move forward now as if the two councils are joined. This means that all members of 8271 will receive all the mailings and notifications that go out to 4618.

As part of our welcome, please remember that if you have not already attended our dinner meeting as our guest you are invited to attend the May and June dinner meetings. Cocktails are at 6:00, dinner at 7:00 and our meetings begin at 8:00. We invite to come for dinner and cocktails and get to know the members of 4618, and greet some of your brothers from 8271 who are also in attendance.

FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY

As some of you know, during part of my term as GK I was also chairman of the

Board of Directors of another organization which, like our council is in a strong financial position. During this time we had a change in treasurers and we were able secure a highly qualified individual to take the treasurer's position. As one of the conditions of acceptance, this individual indicated that he would take the treasurer's role only if funds were audited at the conclusion of each fiscal year by some other members who do not have access to the accounts. I think this is a good stipulation and if I was to be in charge of *any* funds of this council, I would insist on the same condition also.

Food for thought: I therefore, wonder if Council and WCC would find merit in the adoption of a similar practice for all account holders and persons responsible for any monies of the 4618 or WCC. (Members of 8271, WCC means Webster Columbus Center, our meeting facility.) This would include the treasurers of both the WCC and the Council, members responsible for all games of chance, house rentals, bar income and all other people who have responsibility for any of the funds which come into the care of the Council or WCC. What do you think?

WCC BOARD

The GK is also the Chairman of the Board of Directors for the WCC. I am told that usually this is a perfunctory role and that the GK ordinarily does not take an active part in WCC affairs. I have been told also that your present GK has had much more involvement in the WCC

than has been typical. In part this is because being self employed the issues facing the WCC are of interest to me from a business perspective, and also because I think that the Council and the WCC are closely related and some of the issues facing the WCC spill over into Council related matters. Further, this GK has received calls and/or correspondence from the public when some issues relating to the WCC have arisen.

In my last column I indicated that I thought it would be good if members of the WCC board could transition to the council offices and vice versa in order to better share the talents of the two groups. As such, I wonder if there would be merit in thinking about service on the WCC Board being limited to some extent. A scheme that is frequently seen on various boards is for members to serve up to two consecutive three year terms, followed by various time spans off the board before becoming eligible to serve on the board again. In this way, new people could come on to the board and longer term board members could be come eligible to rotate to the officer core or to serve council in other ways for a period of time. Continuity would be obtained while allowing fresh ideas to enter and then experienced board members could return to the board after a hiatus and return charged up with fresh ideas. Food for thought: What do you think?

WINE OR BEER TASTINGS WITH MUSIC

Every once in a while thoughts turn to how we might enjoy our WCC and its lounge more than we do - like say - on a Friday night. A thought occurred to me that a combination of live music - perhaps performed by one/some of the many

church musicians within our multiple parishes - coupled with a wine or beer tasting event might be enjoyable on a Friday or Saturday night. Probably Friday would be best. This could be an informal affair and members and their friends could come and go as their schedules and whims dictate. Could be fun. What do you think?

SECOND RELIGIOUS QUESTION

In the last issue of the *Compass* in recognition of the Lenten period, I asked the question "Was Christ the first Christian?" If your answer to the first question was "No," then the second question is moot. If your answer was "Yes, Christ was the First Christian," then the second question is: "Was Christ the First Catholic? What do you think?"

COUNCIL'S CHAPLAIN EMERTUS, REV. DONALD MCCARTHY, PASSES

Don Bell, P.G.K.

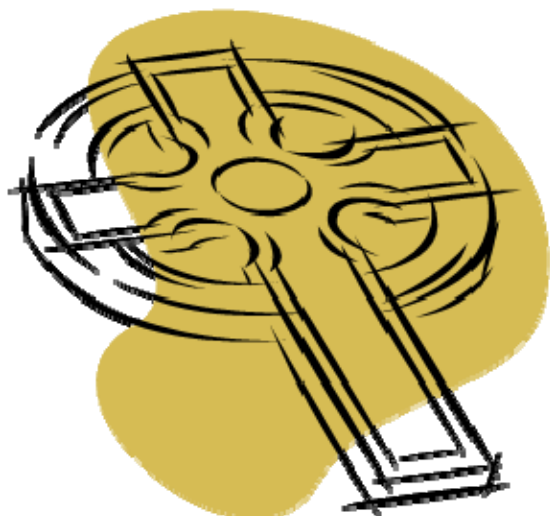
Reverend Donald E. McCarthy, C.S.B., former Chaplain of Trinity Council and most respected cleric in Webster, returned to his Heavenly Father in the early morning of Tuesday, March 15, 2011. He was 81. Fr. McCarthy was the Council's spiritual guide from December, 2001 to September, 2004, when he and the Reverend Joseph Cantanise, both stationed at St. Rita's, joined forces to serve as Council co-Chaplains. That arrangement continued until March, 2006 when Fr. Mac assumed the esteemed title of Chaplain Emeritus.

Fr. McCarthy was born on April 20, 1929 in Rochester. His schooling took place at Sacred Heart parish and St. Thomas Aquinas high school. Upon graduation from Aquinas in 1946 he entered the Congregation of St. Basil's novitiate. He was ordained on June 29, 1958, following which he taught in several Basilian high schools and colleges in the U.S. and Canada.

Fr. McCarthy left teaching to assume the Basilian pastoral service at Irondequoit's Christ the King parish. After retiring as Christ the King's pastor Fr. McCarthy continued his pastoral service at St. John of Rochester, St. Rita's (where he joined fellow Aquinas graduate and Council Chaplain emeritus Fr. John Reif) and Holy Trinity parishes. In his later years he was blessed with the care of the Sisters of St. Joseph at their Motherhouse and infirmary.

Fr. McCarthy's Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated by Bishop Matthew Clark at Blessed Kateri parish's Christ the King Church. Many Basilian and diocesan clergy were on hand to honor Fr. McCarthy, as were many of his students and parishioners. Many Brother Knights were also in attendance. May you rest in Our Lord's peace, dear Father.

[Ed. Note: The Council was honored to provide pallbearers for our late Chaplain Emeritus, not once, but twice. Under the leadership of Brother Don Bell, he, Bob Hafner, P.G.K., Deacon Dick Mahaney, Dave McCoy, Karl Steigerwald and Dick Wagner, P.G.K. assisted at the Mass of Christian Burial. The following morning Father Mac was laid to rest at Holy Sepulcher Cemetery through the efforts of the same crew, but with Dave Samuelson taking the place of Deacon Dick. Annual St. Thomas More Mass

The St. Thomas More Lawyers Guild encourages your attendance on Thursday, May 19th at Our Lady of Victory/St. Joseph Church at 12:10 noon at the annual St. Thomas More Mass. Father Ronald Antinarelli, KCHS, will be the Celebrant and Jesuit Father Edward Salmon S.J., President of McQuaid Jesuit School, will deliver the Homily.

The Mass will be in memory of Blessed John Paul II, and Father Albert Delp S.J., whose life, also honored the commitment of the martyred Saint Thomas More, and both of whom have been submitted for beatification.

Father Albert Delp, a Jesuit, was martyred in 1945 for opposing Germany's euthanasia program of the elderly, ill and unwanted. Father Delp requested and received his final vows secretly in a German prison with the guard sitting at the same table just prior to his execution, despite having been advised, that he would be freed if he renounced his priesthood. He was declared a "Righteous Gentile" by Israel. The Jewish Community (Raoul Wallenberg Foundation) celebrated the 100th Anniversary of his birth, and Father Delp was similarly honored by the Jesuit community in celebrating the 70th Anniversary of his ordination.

Ironically, Gk Chesterton, a catholic convert, prophetically noted in 1920 that St Thomas More was important, but would be more important in 100 years. Pope John Paul II, fully recognized this when he called upon all Catholics, citizens, and politicians to "Be Not Afraid", to stand up to the Culture of Death, and have the courage of St Thomas More to transform society into the Gospel of Life. On October 31, 2000 he proclaimed More to be also the patron saint of statesmen and politicians encouraging all to follow More's example:

Today in fact strongly innovative economic forces are reshaping social structures; on the other hand, scientific achievements in the area of biotechnology underline the need to defend human life at all its different stages, while the promise of a new society – successfully presented to a bewildered public opinion – urgently demands clear political decisions in favor of the family, young people, the elderly, and the marginalized. In this context, it is helpful to turn to the example of St. Thomas More, who distinguished himself by his constant fidelity to legitimate authority and institutions precisely in his intention to serve not power, but the supreme ideal of justice. His life teaches us that government is above all an exercise of virtue.

The annual Mass is held each year on May 19th, on the canonization of St Thomas More by Pope Pious the XI in 1935 in support of the Gospel of Life for spiritual guidance from in this historical, critical time for proper moral judgment, discernment, and, especially, the courage to act responsibly.

The Mass is also sponsored by The New York State Knights of Columbus Finger Lakes Chapter, and GLC.

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TRINITY COUNCIL TO THE RESCUE

The administration of Dave Uerz, Past Grand Knight of Trinity Council 4618, made a daring change. Breaking with tradition, it moved the Charity Dinner, then named Charity Ball, from Fall to Spring. The reason for the move was twofold. First, the officers wanted to better balance the Council's social calendar, then top-heavy with events in the first half of the Columbian year. Second, they felt a move to Spring would allow more time to organize the Council's premier activity. In so doing they unknowingly set the stage for the 41st edition to be arguably the most timely, most helpful fundraiser in Council history.

Three weeks prior to the April 2nd Charity Dinner this year's recipient, the Sr. Regis Food Cupboard, suffered an unspeakable calamity. A fire at the organization's Bay Street facility totally devastated them. The fire not only damaged their facility but rendered their food stocks unusable as well. "We lost everything," Sister Karlien Bach, RSM lamented at the Charity Dinner. As a result, the Food Cupboard was unable to meet the needs of those who depended upon the Food Cupboard for sustenance.

"This gets us back on our feet," Sr. Karlien said as she accepted a \$7,500.00 check from Grand Knight Joseph Kozelsky and Charity Dinner Chairman Barney Quinlan. "Thank you for your extra-ordinary effort," she commended the Council. "You" in this case meant, in addition to Chairman Barney and the Grand Knight, the other committee members: Uerz (who put in "countless hours" according to Grand Knight Joe), Tom O'Connell and Art Manning. Uerz and Past Grand Knight Dave Stein did a fabulous job in producing the event's attractive Program Book.

"You" also includes the Program Book advertisers (ads from members of the extended Council family were up considerably, according to the Grand Knight) and Bingo and Bell Jar volunteers, as significant donations

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were made from those accounts. And let us not forget the ad solicitors. They were the critical conduit for donations. Deputy Grand Knight Dean Hamingson singlehandedly brokered thirteen ads. The Ontario Squad of Dick McHale and Gene VerSchneider somehow garnered twenty-eight between them.

Back for encores were the M.C., the ever-glib O'Connell, the Saelig Trio, comprised of Susan Rowley, Alan Lowne and Jonathan Phillips and New York State Council Communications Director Thomas Freundschuh as stand-in – gotta be careful here as he has final editorial control over this piece – for State Deputy Art Harris of Penfield. Freundschuh also created the helpful table signage. Deacon Stan Douglas moved all to prayer. Father Paul J. Cuddy Fourth Degree Assembly impresario McHale gave a flawless rendition of the Pledge. Jason DeLeo and his crew did not disappoint in preparing and dispensing the meals.

Grand Knight Kozelsky was effusive in his praise of Chairman Barney and the Committee. “This event was so well organized, so well laid out,” he gushed. Freundschuh marveled at the work done by the Sisters of Mercy. “In the reality of the streets that surround St. Francis Xavier Cabrini parish...you stand tall serving with God’s love [and] with no prejudice...to anyone who knocks on your door,” he declared.

Among those supporting the 41st edition in the most important way possible, with their boots on the WCC floor, was Past Grand Knight Dr. Peter Pellitteri. Doc’s claim to trivia fame is that he was Chairman of the Council’s VERY FIRST Charity Ball, held during the administration of Past Grand Knight Robert Hafner.

The Sister Regis Food Cupboard is run by those Sisters of Mercy who reside at St. Stanislaus parish. It is named after its namesake and founder, Sr. Mary Regis, RSM. In 1983 Sr. Mary Regis was asked by the late Bishop of Rochester, Joseph Hogan, to start a social ministry of her choice to assist the poor of the City of Rochester. She decided on the Food Cupboard.

Sr. Mary Regis opened the Food Cupboard in the convent of Mt. Carmel Church. At that time the church had a growing Hispanic membership. A few Sisters and two dozen or so lay volunteers would collect, sort and distribute donated food items year after year. After Sister Mary Regis fell ill Sister Julia Norton, RSM stepped forward to lead the ministry, a role she fills to this day. Sr. Julia along with Sr. Karlien, was an honored guest at the Charity Dinner.

Following the sale of the Mt. Carmel convent in 2009 the Food Cupboard relocated to its present location at 316 Bay Street at Mt. Carmel’s sister church in the Our Lady of the Americas cluster, St. Francis of Assisi. The Sister Regis Food Cupboard serves an area of the City bounded on the north, south, east and west by Clifford Avenue, East Main Street, Goodman Street and Joseph Avenue. Over 700 families receive assistance from the Food Cupboard each month.

The connection between the Sister Regis Food Cupboard and Trinity Council is Margaret and Dan Milner. The Milners first started helping the Food Cupboard about ten years ago when Margaret’s work with St. Paul’s Church’s RCIA program introduced her to Sr. Karlien. Since then they have regularly collected for and contributed to the Food Cupboard. Dan, for example, collects canned food contributions from members at every General Membership Meeting of the Council. If you are interested in helping the Food Cupboard on a regular basis please contact Brother Knight Dan Milner.

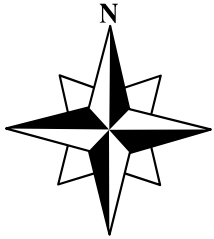
