

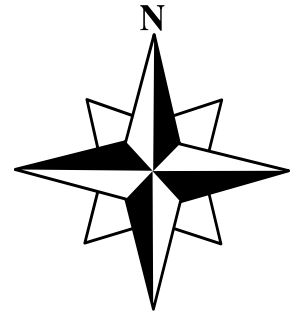

A KNIGHT OFF

As I turn the page on my weekly desk calendar, I am reminded that next week, I will begin my 52nd year on this earth. I engage to reflect how I am just old enough to remember having to walk to school or having to plow the fields to ensure extra food on the table for my seven brothers and sister during the summer and fall months. Yet, seemingly at the same time, I am old enough to be part of the computer revolution of the last 30 years that without it, I do not know what my life would be like without a keyboard and monitor in front of me.

Well, I am going to celebrate my birthday early by taking "A KNIGHT OFF" and just writing about anything I wish, instead of working on a KofC project. Of course, this will not be KofC centric, but something you will enjoy.

The Green Thing.

I often get frustrated at work because all I ever hear about anymore is "REDUCE, REUSE, and RECYCLE" or the other prominent term of "GO GREEN". In my building there is even a "GREEN TEAM" that ensures everything that is thrown out is put in its proper container. Well, thinking about my new not so young age, I will enjoy these next minutes, thinking of my youthfulness.

A journalistic peer of mine, Jim Knowles, penned an article early last year, which I ad lib and add to, that seems to be a fitting response to all of this "GREEN STUFF". Enjoy the reading.

In the line at the store, the cashier told the older woman that

plastic bags weren't good for the environment. The woman apologized to her and explained, "We didn't have the green thing back in my day."

That's right; they didn't have the green thing in her day. Back then, they returned their milk bottles, Coke bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, using the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled. But they didn't have the green thing back in her day.

Back then, they didn't fire up an engine and burn gasoline just to cut the lawn. They used a push mower that ran on human power. They exercised by working so they didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity. But she's right; they didn't have the green thing back then.

They drank from a fountain when they were thirsty, instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time they had a drink of water. They refilled pens with ink, instead of buying a new pen, and they replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

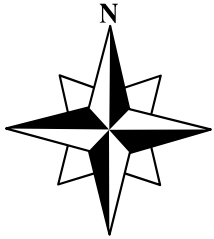
But they didn't have the green thing back then.
