



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## Grand Knight's Message

### *Trinity Council Helping Our Parishes*

At the March dinner and council meeting we had the honor of having four priests in attendance. While I'm sure that our monthly offer of a complimentary dinner didn't hurt in getting them to attend, I'm convinced that was not the only reason they decided to join us. With our Parish Round Table program formally up and running it is no surprise that these busy men came to share a meal with us and learn more about the activities of our council.

As the Columbian year winds down I wanted to thank all the Brother Knights who have stepped forward to lead special activities at the parish level. While I typically hesitate to call out individuals by name, in fear of missing someone, I did want to highlight a few individuals who have made significant contributions. At the top of the list is PSD Walt Bitler who has helped get our Parish Round Table program up and running in a formal manner. As a past state deputy, Art is very much aware of the importance of parish based activities to both fulfill our Orders' commitment to our Church and as a powerful membership recruitment tool for our council. At the parish level I want to thank our parish coordinators for their involvement in ensuring the execution of numerous service programs that Art has laid the groundwork for.

St Maximilian Kolbe : A team of Knights, lead by FN Joe Bradbury has recently completed a very successful Lenten fish fry program. In addition, Brother Steve Lodestro continues to play a major part in parish pancake breakfasts on Sunday mornings throughout the year. Both of these activities not only generated funds for the parish but also strengthen the parish's sense of community by bringing together the parishioners for a shared meal.

Holy Trinity: Walt Kowalski has worked closely with the parish to generate an extensive list of volunteer opportunities and has already completed a number of maintenance projects with the assistance of his fellow Knights. Also at Holy Trinity, the recently completed annual spring cemetery clean up, coordinated by PGK Tom Freundsuh, not only exemplifies our support for the parish but also honors our deceased Brother Knights through our annual care of their eternal resting places.

St Rita: A large number of Knights continue to be actively involved in the Lenten fish fry and the Sunday Breakfast programs. Many of these same Knights are also involved with the outstanding Scouting program based there.

## Two Council Members Take Third Degree At Bishop's Burse

Our order's motto "In Solidarity With Our Priests" was self-evident as Knights and Ladies from all over the Finger Lakes Chapter gathered in Corning, New York for the annual Bishop's Burse Dinner and Third Degree Exemplification that was held on Saturday, March 31<sup>st</sup>.

The day started out at Noon with the Third Degree Exemplification conducted by the Finger Lakes Chapter Third Degree Team, of which our own PGK David Stein is a member. The Degree was held at Rogers Hall located behind Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Painted Post. Thirty Brother Knights, including Mitch Palermo and Neil McKenna from Trinity Council, were welcomed into Full Knighthood. Mitch was sponsored by PGK David Stein and Neil was sponsored by Cuddy Assembly Faithful Navigator Joseph Bradbury.

After the Degree ceremony Knights and Ladies gathered at St. Mary's Church in Corning to attend 5:00 PM Mass celebrated by Finger Lakes Chapter Chaplain Fr. John Gagnier. Following Mass it was on to the Bishop's Burse Dinner at the American Legion Hall in Corning.

The Bishop's Burse Dinner is where Knights from Councils, Assemblies, Finger Lakes Chapter, and State Council gather each year to honor our Diocese's Bishop and

show our "support" for him (hence being "In Solidarity With Our Priests") not only in a spiritual way but to also to help our Bishop via monetary support through donations presented to him at the Dinner that he uses to support the Diocese's vocations efforts to find and prepare candidates to become priests. Each K of C entity attending the dinner presents a check to the Bishop for vocations, their generosity made possible from fundraisers held throughout the year.

During the social hour prior to dinner Grand Knight David Uerz and I had the great honor and privilege to talk for a few minutes with our Bishop, the Most Reverend Matthew H. Clark. The evening's program began with introduction of the various dignitaries in attendance which included Bishop Clark, Sr. Mary Ann Binsack, Fr. John Gagnier, Fr. Lew Brown, Supreme Director Arthur Harris PSD and his wife Marlene, New York State Council Advocate Michael Stephany and fiancée Trudy Long and Finger Lakes Chapter President James Smith. After the Invocation by Fr. Gagnier, posting of the Colors by the Fourth Degree Color Corps, a Candle Ceremony to honor those who were lost on September 11, 2001 and the Pledge of Allegiance, a wonderful dinner was served to all in attendance.

Following dinner presentations of donations to Bishop Clark were made by the Finger Lakes Chapter, councils (including a \$250 check from Trinity Council presented by GK David Uerz, and Fourth Degree Assemblies and by the New York State Council. The State's presentation was made by

State Council Advocate Michael Stephany, who was also the Finger Lakes Chapter's Honoree for this year's dinner. Mike presented a check for \$5,000 from the New York State Council to Bishop Clark. (Another check for \$5,000 was given to the Bishop at the Albany Prayer Rally on March 13, 2012).

Bishop Clark then gave a gracious talk thanking the Knights for their generosity and their prayers. He noted how the donations helped to fund the vocational education for new priests in training. He remarked that it was not long ago that there were only five seminarian students in training but was most pleased to report that by September, 2012 there will be twenty students. Bishop Clark asked us to pray that this upward trend for vocations continues.

The Bishop also mentioned the wonderful help the Diocese has received from priests from Africa who help out at our parishes. (Father Symon and Father Paul, take a bow!) The Bishop then spoke on the subject of his impending retirement when he reaches his 75<sup>th</sup> birthday this July. He will then send his resignation letter to the Pope as required by canon law. According to the Bishop, the process to find his replacement could take up to a year. He closed by saying that he wants to retire in the Rochester area and continue to minister here. He may also do some writing.

The evening then concluded with a Benediction given by Fr. Lew Brown.

On March, 24th, 2012, a cool, damp Saturday morning, the boys and girls 10 to 14 years who were champions from the Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse and Northern minor conferences that make up the Upstate Conference gathered at Bishop Ludden High School in Syracuse to compete for the chance to advance to the New York Council Free Throw Championship. I am pleased to report that our Council will have two winners representing us at this year's State Championship.

Ryan Welch will be competing in the Boys' 10 year olds

classification. In the Girls' 13 year olds classification Darcy Weidman, daughter of PGK Andy and Louise, has advanced as well. One other winner I would like to note is Craig Eichas, the 12 year old Boys winner out of Spencerport Council 7707. Craig's Dad Tyler is a gym teacher at Plank Road South. He has been instrumental in helping Mark Ludington, our Council Chairman, promote the Free Throw program in our area.

The winners from the Upstate Conference will now go on to compete in the New York State Council Championship to be held at the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York on Saturday, April 28. The Upstate champions will face the champions from the other two major conferences (Downstate and Long Island) and will shoot best of 25 free throws to determine which one of the "Final Three" in each age group of boys and girls will be a State

Champion. Each State winner's score will then be submitted to Supreme Council to determine if their score is the highest in the Order for their group. If so, they will be recognized as an International Champion.

## Supporting Our Seminarians Part II

For over a year now, a quiet but steadfast campaign has been taking place by the Diocese of Rochester, initiated, by our Most Reverend Bishop Matthew H. Clark. The campaign is called *Our Legacy, Our Future, Our Hope...* Bishop Clark's Campaign for Priests and Seminarians.

The Catholic faithful have long been noted for their loyal support of the priests who have baptized and taught their children, reached the Gospel, presided at their weddings, comforted them in their sufferings, forgiven their sins, and celebrated the Eucharist. At a certain point in life, however, even the most tireless of servants needs an opportunity to rest from his labors. The ordinary retirement age for our Diocesan priests is 70.

The Diocese of Rochester is blessed with extraordinary priests. Even after retiring from administration, most continue to assist at parishes and Diocesan agencies until their later years. We have a moral obligation to provide adequately for the welfare of our priests during their retirement.

The Priest Pension Trust was established by Bishop Sheen in 1968 in response to the provisions of the Second Vatican Council. Due to shifting demographics and recent market trends, the Priest Pension Trust is now underfunded.

In order to meet the anticipated needs of our retired priests, the current Pension Trust requires an infusion of at least \$5,000,000 from this special fundraising initiative. Any remaining funds needed must come from increased contributions from our parishes.



All incardinated priests in the Diocese participate in this non-qualified defined benefit pension plan. The plan provides a maximum monthly benefit of \$1,100 assuming retirement at age 70 with 30 years of service. Vesting takes place after three years of service with prorated benefits based on the number of years of service. Net assets for the plan were approximately \$11,000,000 as of June 30, 2010. According to the latest actuarial report, the projected benefit obligation was \$18,000,000. These valuations assume no increase in the monthly benefit of \$1,100. Occasional cost of living increases, however, would balloon the required benefit obligation to approximately \$21,000,000.

Currently, the Diocese of Rochester has 14 seminarians and pre-seminarians studying for the priesthood. The Diocese had as few as four in 2007. We are truly blessed to have this number of men stepping forward

to answer God's call to serve. Recent studies have proven that this is part of a national trend. The Diocese expects even more seminarians in the future.

The Diocese believes that financial impediments should not stand in the way of young men willing to respond to their call to the priesthood. As the number of seminarians and pre-seminarians dramatically rises in our Diocese, the cost of the vital obligation of educating these men also increases.

The average cost to educate a seminarian today is about \$40,000 per year. This represents a significant increase over previous years due to the escalating costs of higher education. The Diocese shoulders this expense; assisted by funds that have been set aside for seminary education. These funds, including proceeds received from the sale of St. Bernard's Seminary and the Becket Hall dormitory, generate income of approximately \$200,000 annually while \$600,000 was actually needed to educate men in 2010/2011. Any remaining funds needed must come from increased contributions from our parishes.

It is absolutely critical for the future of the Diocese of Rochester that they address this shortage of funds now so that the Diocese can continue to attract outstanding applicants and give them the best training and education possible, equipping

them well for a lifetime of service.

The minimum amount needed to fund Bishop Clark's initiatives and legacy is approximately \$10,000,000. A "Nice to Have Amount" is \$14,000,000. As of April 1st, 2012 approximately \$9.5M has already been raised. This has been made possible by individual meetings with donors and conducting small campaign receptions in different areas of the diocese.


Well over a year ago, Bishop Clark approached the Finger Lakes Knights of Columbus and asked them to donate a sum of \$100,000 over a five year period, to this campaign. Now a \$100,000 does not seem like much amongst \$10,000,000, but to the Knights of Columbus, this is an extraordinary amount.

The officers of the Finger Lakes Chapter met with the leadership of the Diocese and agreed that this could be accomplished.

Why did the Finger Lakes Chapter accept such a challenge? Because we would not have to do anything different or in addition to what we are already doing to support the seminarians in the diocese. Last June an agreement was signed for the requested amount. Between, the Chapters direct financial support of seminarians, the annual gift to the Bishop from the state C&B funds and the Chapter's underwriting costs of the annual Vocations Awareness Dinner, the fi-

ancial outlay alone from these events, will drive us to completing our commitment.

In fact, not even two full years into the five year campaign, over half the money committed by the Finger Lakes Chapter has already been raised.



The Finger Lakes Chapter, Knights of Columbus, for which Trinity Council No. 4618 is a part of and participates in, is doing its part to support the Roman Catholic Church.

## A Letter to Trinity Council

To GK Dave Uerz, loyal Officers, and fellow Knights of Trinity Council:

Thank you for allocating a portion of our council's charitable funds to the Boy Scouts of America by sponsoring my participation in the "21 Stories for Scouts" fundraiser. In addition, several individual Knights have also made generous personal pledges of sponsorship.

As you know, proceeds from this event will benefit the expansion of Boy Scouting in Rochester's urban locations. The operating principle is that if young people are constructively engaged during their teen years, it helps them steer away from trouble and make something of themselves as adults.

I'm acquainted with a man who volunteers as an assistant Scoutmaster, and he also works professionally as a teacher with educational programs in a NY state prison. He made a pledge to sponsor me, remarking, "I've often said that I would not have had many of the students that I have had over the last 22 years in prison, if there were more opportunities like Scouting available to them."

Just imagine, altering someone's life enough to turn a would-be criminal into a contributing member of society. That's what this particular drive for urban Scouting is all about; to guide young lives in the right direction early enough.

I'm personally involved in two aspects of the urban Scouting project: raising funds and training new Scoutmasters. We recently trained

a number of new Scoutmasters for city troops, and I have faith in their abilities. The next step is raising financial resources to support their important work.

The big fundraising event itself will be held downtown on Friday, May 18, when sponsored individuals will rappel from the roof of First Federal Plaza. It's a 309-foot rappel down 21 stories, and I'm looking forward to it. This opportunity came along at a good time for me, just after I've healed enough from last year's spinal surgery to take it on.

My initial goal was to raise \$1K for urban Scouting, but with Trinity Council's support I have already surpassed \$1,260 and the Boy Scout council is urging me to strive for the \$1,500 level. If I can reach this amount, then my son Joe, who is an Eagle Scout, will also rappel for the additional sponsorship.

I'm quite familiar with the effort it takes to raise funds at the Columbus Center, and it's heartwarming to have fellow Knights, as well as St. Rita parishioners, Scouting families, karate students, and others behind me in this cause. One of my sponsors declared that he always wanted a friend who could leap over tall buildings, but he's willing to settle for one who leaps OFF tall buildings ...

We must also applaud our illustrious Chancellor Dave McCoy. Dave is a former Scoutmaster, and he arranged a contribution of used tents and camping gear to city Scouts from Webster's Troop 113 at the United Church of Christ. So together, we're providing trained Scoutmasters, equipment, and fi-

nancial backing for the urban Scouting initiative.

Let's pray that the results of this event, like so many other worthy projects we're involved in, provides meaningful assistance exactly where it's most needed.




