

Grand Knight's Message

40th "Anniversary" of Roe v. Wade

As has been our practice for a number of years now, at each officer's meeting we review the Pro-Life activities that are underway within our organization. As a strong Pro-Life council there is always something to discuss and with Jan 22nd approaching, the topic of the "40th Anniversary" of Roe v. Wade was brought up. As we lamented over the coming of this sad day, one of the council officers made the statement "Isn't there another word that should be used in place of anniversary, it just doesn't seem to be the right word to describe a terrible event." This really caught my attention and ever since that meeting I have been thinking of how that simple statement hits home with me.

To many of us, the word anniversary typically brings to mind positive events in our personal lives such as our wedding anniversaries or the anniversary of the opening of a church or school. While grammatically correct, using this word to indicate the beginning of a time in this country when so many innocent lives would be lost just doesn't seem right to me either. Over the past month I have struggled to bring closure in my mind to this linguistical disconnect. As time went on, it became apparent to me that there have been other events in history that we have used the word anniversary to remember sad events of the past, take December 7th, 1941 for example. We use this term the "The Anniversary of the Bombing of Pearl Harbor" to emotionally connect the terrible events of that day to a point in time. I now realized that both of these days immortalize the beginning of a time in this country when many lives would be lost, millions heroically killed in WWII as the result of aggression of others outside our country and millions killed from within, as the result of a misguided opinion of our own Supreme Court that the unborn child has no rights, not even the right to be born.

In the 40 years since the Roe v Wade decision many people have continued the "fight" to correct this terrible wrong but like WWII, there have been many setbacks along the way. While many prefer to isolate themselves from the issue by saying it is a political battle that will never be won, others have stepped forward and lead the charge. Like the citizens of this country who worked behind the scenes to support the troops who landed at Normandy and other battlegrounds of the war, I encourage you to help support the efforts of those who do so much to try to save the lives of so many they will never know. Similar to the sacrifices made by the men and women who valiantly fought to protect us and the innocent of Europe, we too must continue to fight for those who can't protect themselves. It is only by all of us working together that we can hope to soon celebrate the

Our Moral Responsibility—Beyond questions of politics, abortion fundamentally remains a moral issue that Christians have a duty to oppose.

This month, we observe the 40th anniversary of the infamous *Roe v. Wade* decision. Of all the things that will be said about this court case in the days ahead, one thing remains beyond dispute: Abortion is the issue that will not go away.

Indeed, 40 years after the Supreme Court handed down its decision, most Americans consider abortion to be morally wrong, and a large majority wants significant restrictions on its availability. As long as this is the case, *Roe v. Wade* cannot be considered as "settled."

There is another reason as well: The fundamental ruling of *Roe v. Wade* rests upon a falsehood, namely that we cannot tell when the life of a human being begins. Today, we know beyond doubt that a child in the womb is precisely that — a child. No constitutional system can rest secure when it is premised on what is widely believed by many to be a lie.

And there is a third reason: No legal system can be truly committed to human rights if it supports the principle that it is acceptable to intentionally kill the innocent. *Roe v. Wade* not only accepts this principle, but elevates it to a constitutional right.

During the recent U.S. elections, some pro-life candidates poorly articulated their position and lost, and some pro-abortion candidates embraced their position to an extreme and still won. For this reason, some have suggested that a candidate in the future cannot hope to be both pro-life and successful.

The grand illusion regarding the abortion issue is that it can be treated exclusively in political terms. Because abortion is fundamentally a moral question, we should expect it to be resolved in accordance with philosophical and ethical principles.

Certainly, many of those who voted in favor of abortion rights were acting according to their own principles. For nearly two centuries, philosophers of both the left and the right have laid the groundwork for society's acceptance of abortion.

In the 19th century, Karl Marx and Frederick Engels argued that the traditional family structure oppressed women. The only way women could gain true equality, they said, was to be "liberated" from the responsibilities of motherhood and family, and by finding employment outside the home. For these writers, the demands of family life made true equality impossible.

On the other side, the libertarian philosopher John Stuart Mill likewise believed that the communal demands of family life made true individual freedom impossible.

Whether socialist or libertarian, both sides saw family as the problem and agreed that the solution was for women to escape motherhood and family. And so today, on both the left and the right, we find those who maintain that "liberation" depends upon the absolute power to control fertility and therefore depends upon the availability of legal abortion.

Within the Christian tradition, we understand that, in regard to the transmission of human life, we are called to cooperate with our Creator and that no person is entitled to claim absolute control over another human life already called into existence. The life of every human being is first and foremost a gift of the Creator.

In these circumstances, the responsibility of Catholics remains clear: It is to articulate a clear, consistent understanding of Catholic social teaching in regard to the dignity of the human person, marriage and the family. It is our responsibility to do this in season and out of season, regardless of which political party may benefit. As Catholics, our course must be set by our Church's moral compass and not by partisan political calculation or advantage.

And what of the Knights of Columbus? We are called to be what our name implies — to be faithful, to be steadfast, to come to the defense of those who cannot defend themselves and to remain on the field until the field is won.

Vivat Jesus!

Council Programs Recognized by Supreme

At the January General Membership Meeting District Deputy George Schenk, on behalf of the Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus, presented Grand Knight Dave Uerz with the Columbian Award for the 2011-12 Columbian Year. The award recognizes Trinity Council's ability to conduct a minimum of four activities in each of the following areas during the preceding Columbian Year: church, community, council, family, pro-life and youth.

Think about that for a



minute. That's at least twenty-four events, or two per month. Now that is indeed impressive. Keep in mind that some events, such as Hill Haven Nursing Home Catholic services, took place more than once.

Grand Knight Uerz accepted the award on behalf of the Council's Program Director, Deputy Grand Knight Dean Hamingson, the event chairmen and all of the Brother Knights who stepped forward to make the activities happen. He specifically saluted Tom Freundschuh, PGK, for taking the time to write up and submit the application. We concur.

from our orders 130 year history. The intent is to inform you of global involvements you may not be aware of. Courtesy of kofc.org

2001: In response to the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, the Knights on Sept. 12 establishes its \$1 million Heroes Fund. Checks for \$3,000 are presented to the families of all full-time professional law enforcement, firefighters and emergency medical personnel who lost their lives at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Forty-five Knights were killed on 9/11.

2002: The Order establishes a \$2 million Pacem in Terris Fund to promote peace and education initiatives in the Holy Land and provide support for the Christian



community there.

2003: 100,000 copies of a pocketsized prayer book, Armed With the Faith, are printed by the Order and the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, and sent to troops in Iraq and Afghanistan, along with 10,000 rosaries.

2005: The Knights send 2,000 wheelchairs to land-mine victims and people with disabilities in Afghanistan and elsewhere. Through its partnership with the Global Wheelchair Mission, Knights have since distributed nearly 25,000 wheelchairs around the world.

2005: Villa Maria Guadalupe, the Order's pro-life retreat center in Stamford, Conn., operated by the Sisters of Life, opens.

2006: In its first international expansion in almost a century, the Order charters its first councils in Poland, beginning with John Paul II Council 14000 in Krakow.

2006: In the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina in the U.S. Gulf, Knights donate more than \$10 million and 100,000 volunteer hours to help rebuild Catholic churches and schools.

2007: The Knights of Columbus Incarnation Dome, a 3,780-square-foot mosaic depicting mysteries of Christ's life, is constructed at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception.

2007: Represented by the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, the Knights and K of C families are defendant-intervenors in a case challenging the words "under God" in the Pledge of Allegiance. Court decisions in 2009 and 2010 uphold the words' constitutionality.
