



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Grand Knight's Message

As the Columbian year draws to a close our principles, as Knights and Catholic Gentlemen and Women, of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism are even more imperative. Religious freedom is under attack in many parts of the world including here in the United States. Here in the U.S. although the new Affordable Care Act provides many benefits to the uninsured, it has also mandated converge contrary to our Christian beliefs. In Iraq and Syria, ISIS or the Islamic State has forced Christians who had been living peacefully in that area for over 1600 years to convert, pay a tax, or face execution. Many tried to flee but many more were brutally executed. Almost all Catholic, Christian churches and religious sites were destroyed. Islamist extremism is a defamiation not only to Islam itself but to every other religion in the world. Even in emerging democracies religious freedom is suspect.

Christians, Jews, Muslims, and members of every other faith have a right not to be hindered in the practice of their faith. The right to religious liberty is protected under our U.S. Constitution and internationally under the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. On a worldwide basis, 75% of the world's population live in areas where either religious freedom is either highly restricted or non-existent. Pope Francis has pointed out that Christians are being persecuted for their religion

in numbers exceeding those martyred during the Roman Empire. He has also condemned the world's "complicit silence." In western societies there is a confusion between religious freedom and unconstrained freedom. Does the government have a right to impose sanctions on businesses and groups which undermine their religious freedom in the name of privilege?

Charity is not only the first principle of the Knights of Columbus but is manifest throughout the history of Christianity and provides the foundation of religious liberty. By serving others we devote ourselves to the love of God and fully participate in it.

Our Charity affirms the dignity of those we serve. Charity and religious freedom are key to social, economic, and intellectual growth of western societies. In Jesus' words: "I give you a commandment to love one another..." he gives a simple and profound definition of Charity which we as members of the Knights of Columbus fully embrace.

So, our mandate is to continue works of Charity in everything we do whether it is an organized event, cause or just a simple act. Charity guarantees religious freedom.

This year, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops is again having "The Fortnight for Freedom",

It is celebrated at the same time as great martyrs are celebrated who remained faithful during periods of political persecution including St. John Fisher. To quote Archbishop William E. Lori, the Chairman of Adhoc Committee of Religious Liberty: *Keeping the spirit of the Gospel means that Catholic institutions are to bear witness in love to the full truth about the human person by providing social, charitable, and educational services in a manner that fully reflects the God-given dignity of the human person.*"

WHY THE CAPITAL FUND DRIVE?

A review of some of the things already said and some update.

\$15,350. This is the amount pledged from the CFD (Capital Fund Drive). If you recall from the previous column only two pledges have been paid in full with \$6935 of the above amount being received. So we have a ways to go to bring all pledges to completion.

Here is a perspective of some of the things that need to be done in the immediate future or have already been completed.

The front roof has been replaced. This had been put off for several years and we have reached the time when we must do this – original estimates were approximately \$18,000 to \$20,000 however, we were able to find an installer who was able to do this for \$9500. Funds were taken from our reserves. We also need new carpeting in the hall and lounge – our first estimates have ranged upwards of \$14,000 (which, of course, we have rejected). Instead we were able to purchase some carpet tiles at a significantly reduced cost and make monthly payments. They are currently stored in the trailer and will be installed at a later date. Of course, there will be additional costs for this.

Thus, we have just completed expenditures of upwards of



\$15,000 and our CFD has only realized about \$7000 to date. We hope this presents a picture of the importance of the CFD to the membership and why we have initiated the drive.

Some have wondered why we need the drive and why can't we pay for our building costs through contributions of Bingo and Bell Jar and rental revenues?

It's important to keep in mind that rents can only offset a portion of our costs because the primary purpose of the building is to serve the council for its meetings, activities, projects, the auxiliary, degree exemplifications, Fourth Degree and other K of C related activities significantly reducing the opportunities for earning revenue. These activities account

for approximately 1/3 of the year. Regarding Bingo and Bell Jar, the primary purpose of their proceeds are for charitable purposes – the greatest of the principles of the K of C.

Therefore, the WCC needs to turn to the members of 4618 for its support for capital expenditures. Please think favorably about joining the CFD to support our home if you haven't done so already. Remember too, that each member of 4618 is also a full and bonafide member of the WCC. All are invited to attend the WCC board meetings and provide input. This is your building. More, next month.

Sometimes it is easy to overlook the simplest of things.

Take the beneficiaries on your life insurance policies. If your policy was applied for and issued several years ago, it could very well be that the beneficiary originally designated to receive the proceeds from that policy needs to be updated. If you bought the policy when you were single, for example, you may have named your parents as beneficiaries. If you have since been married, that could be updated to reflect your spouse, and even your children.

Most people list a primary beneficiary – that person is specifically designated as the first in priority to receive policy proceeds. We also encourage the naming of a contingent beneficiary – an alternate person designated to receive policy proceeds, usually in the event that the original beneficiary pre-deceases the insured.

When I call to arrange your annual “insurance check-up,” one of the matters that we can discuss is the status of your beneficiary designations. If they need updating, and they often do, I can usually complete the paperwork during the appointment.

I look forward to meeting with you to review all your life insurance policies.

2015 New York State Council Convention Report

The 120th Annual New York State Council Knights of Columbus Convention was held at the Villa Roma Resort in Callicoon, New York April 23-25. The first day's activities included Mass and a wonderful dinner enjoyed by the delegates and their ladies.

The always-inspiring second day was highlighted by the morning business meeting that featured a video message from our Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson. He spoke on the strength of the insurance arm of the Knights (soon to be 1 billion in assets) recognized for the second year in a row as one of the world's most ethical companies by the Ethisphere Institute and all the good works that the Knights do. Among them: monies donated to charities, man hours spent helping others, our Order's support for the upcoming World Special Olympics in Los Angeles later this year; the World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia September 22 -27 and Pope Francis' visit there; and the importance of the role that Knights play in promoting our Catholic faith. We also had the wonderful opportunity to hear from Supreme Treasurer Michael J. O'Connor who expounded on the Supreme Knight's message with further details on the Order's activities in different parts of the world.

Delegates heard reports by State officers, program chairmen and directors. Supreme Director Arthur Harris gave the Memoriam Report and mentioned Senior Associate State Chaplain Father Brian McEweeny's wonderful eulogies at the morning's Mass, including one for our own Raymond P. Pfeifer. State Deputy Carmine Musumeci gave a report detailing the great things we have done as Knights throughout New York State.

The Friday afternoon session began with the State

Council Awards presentation ceremonies. Trinity Council was once again recognized for C&B, this time as the 2014 C&B Total Sales Category Leader with 420 books sold for Councils with 301-350 members. This award will be presented to our Council C & B Chairman Joe Dilal at our June Council meeting. Rounding out the session were meetings to conduct business of the Finger Lakes (Rochester area) Minor Conference and the Upstate (Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, and Northern) Major Conference.

The major items of business at both meeting were nominations for State Officers for elections to take place during the Saturday morning State Council business session and nominations for delegates to the 133rd Supreme Convention to be held August 4th - 6th, 2015 in Philadelphia. The day ended with a formal dinner on Friday evening featuring the awarding of the State Family of the Year to The McNally Family.

The final convention session began on Saturday morning with a few final committee reports and concluded with the nomination and election of State Council officers. Elected as State Council officers for the 2015-2016 Columbian Year were: State Deputy Robert D. Weitzman; State Secretary Kenneth F. Latham Jr.; State Treasurer Edward C. Kennedy, Sr.; State Advocate Gary J. Leonardo; and State Warden Edward A. Ciulla.


